

# **Sustainability Framework Labour Standards**

### **Key points**

- Sites embracing open hiring policies

#### **Best practice**

Ensuring good and ethical labour conditions and respecting human rights include different dimensions such as work contracts, diversity, codes of conduct, collective agreement and bargaining, and modern slavery prevention.

## What the Australian industry is currently doing

- Several sites are embracing open hiring policies, and actively promote diversity and inclusivity by providing opportunities to ESL individuals, long-term unemployed, and previously incarcerated individuals.
- Some sites are implementing whistleblower policies to encourage employees to come forward with any concerns.

- The diverse needs of workers are being

   acknowledged with flexible shift schedules, and
   the accommodation of individual preferences
   and personal requirements.
- Several sites pay above minimum wage.
- Striving for stable and secure employment, sites predominantly offer full-time positions, reserving casual roles only upon specific request from workers.
- The Social Accountability Accreditation program (SA 8000:2014) has been adopted by some sites to ensure ethical practices throughout their operations.
- Several sites are engaging in recruitment efforts targeting high school students through specialised programs that introduce them to the industry, with the aim to attract them to pursue a career in the field.

#### Sustainability Framework key industry commitment

- We are committed to continual improvement to support health, safety and wellbeing for industry workers including a year-on-year reduction in Lost Time Injury Frequency Rates and training of all employees on safety.

- We are committed to having a positive impact in the communities in which we operate.
